Relief

The Metropolitan Almoners fund continues to Match-Fund the financial support given by Lodges to their own members and dependants. If you have a case and feel MAF can assist please contact your ALO and bring the matter to his attention. He will guide you through the application process and ensure the matter is swiftly reviewed by the MAF committee. Those lodges that have relief chests and sufficient funds available can of course withdraw up to £500 to give immediate support to those in time of need. I urge all members to remain vigilant and pro-active regarding the identification of their own Brethren in their time of need. The Masonic Charities are now handling around 60 cases a Month from London, but we feel sure some in-need are still going unnoticed, please help us to make sure that those who qualify for help receive it.

Masonic charities made disbursement to 528 London Freemasons and their dependants in the 12 months to 31st December 2015 which totals £2.129.580

Mum's the Word!



With Mum approaching 97 years of age it was becoming very obvious that she could not continue to live an independent life style. She had been living on her own since Dad had passed away some 22 years ago and even though she had carers provided by the Local Authority she was finding it more and more difficult to do the simple things in life such as climbing the stairs to go to bed, making a cup of tea and preparing a ready made meal and she was fast becoming a prisoner in her own home. Our first thoughts was to get the Adult Social Services involved from the Local Authority to discuss her future Care needs. Unfortunately this proved to be tantamount to dealing with a piece of jelly.

Then it struck me that having been a Mason for some 26 years there may be something that could be gained by talking to the Lodge Almoner. Within 24 hours of doing this the Lodge Almoner, Worshipful Brother Gareth Jones, advised me to get in touch with Masonic Charities on 0800 035 6090. Talking to them I learnt that there was an RMBI Care Home, James Terry Court, some ten minutes drive from my home. I immediately got in touch and received friendly and helpful advice and assistance from Tracey Taylor the Business Manager and Michelle Belch the Manager of the Home plus all the staff that I came in contact with.

From the time of first contact until the date Mum moved into the Home took little more than four weeks. Which is remarkably quick considering in that time the Local Authority has not even bothered responding to their initial visit to discuss Mum's future Care needs. James Terry Court now provides Mum with a more caring, friendly and relaxing lifestyle where she is safe and her immediate family do not have to worry about her. She tells me that the food is excellent and that she has been to the hairdresser twice since taking up residence. All of this was achieved with a few visits to look around the home and a friendly chat about deferring payment to enable mum to sell her home before meeting the full cost of residency.

I think I can sum up how we feel about James Terry Court by quoting my wife after having looked around for the first time, she turned to me and said "this is like a 5 star hotel its a lot better than the hotels we stay in when we go on holiday".

- Pre-loved Regalia.
- Florence Nightingale Lodge for Almoners.

What is sure you will be aware of what constitutes the key elements of the role along with the necessary attributes and skills required to be successful in the office.

You will get the opportunity to learn from the presenters and from your colleagues attending the workshop. The room is full of a wealth of knowledge and experience happy to address any questions or give advice on situations that when new to the role may appear daunting. One of the key benefits of attending is that you will certainly feel refreshed in knowing how important the role is and the support available around you.

We also provide a live demonstration of the tools available to assist you in the role that are available on porchway. Part way through the workshop we have a break that includes a well-stocked buffet, again this is a vital part of the workshop where you have the opportunity to interact with your peers.

The Metropolitan Grand Almoner is usually present and will present you with your Certificate of Achievement and an Almoner lapel pin badge. Post event you will be sent a copy of the material covered on the workshop. Feedback is sought and so far the response from attendees has been extremely positive.

Hello I am Keith Rawson, a Past Master of two London Lodges and 1 Leicestershire and Rutland Lodge. I am Secretary and Almoner of Telephone Lodge No. 3301 and Junior Warden of my L & R Lodge. I am SLGR and a VO in London.

I have been Charity Steward and Almoner of Telephone Lodge and, therefore, responsible for the building up of funds as well as distribution. This follows my fundamental belief that the horse has to go before the cart - you can't spend what you haven't got.

As far as being Almoner is concerned, the decision to make the trip came from writing to and contacting widows and "retired" members but only knowing one or two of them. I felt that reporting on their situation, without really knowing them was not doing the job properly. Although the wide geographical spread did not make it easy, my wife accompanied me and we treated it as a holiday. My first reaction was to think of the visits as rewarding but on reflection, it went beyond that to the extent it was a privilege. In general, I think of the Almoners duties as putting something back and the more I have done it, the more I have enjoyed it.

It is certainly something I will hope to repeat on, at least, an

annual basis. Frankly, it was as enjoyable as any decent holiday and I genuinely feel a have made a number of new friends.

- The young widow has 2 children of school age and is left in a desperate financial situation.
- The widow went back to work to support the family and keep the family house.
- The lodge rally around and help is obtained from national Masonic charities.

- This help continues at lodge and national masonic level through the years as the boys grow up.
- The boys today have successful careers and their stories are interesting.
- In the present (approx. 15 years later) the widow has remarried and contact has been kept with the lodge.
- She cannot believe the support she received and is "eternally grateful" to Freemasonry.

In her words, we made "a big difference" for the whole family.

It was pointed out that the burden on the Lodge could be lessened by use of the 'Adopt a Widow' scheme, whereby the Almoner very commendably responded that the Lodge would not like to do that as the widows were of the Lodge and effectively members of the Lodge, they were known and loved by the lodge.

The Almoner had been in the post for over five years and had got to know each of the widows personally, obviously they trusted him and were comfortable in his care.

Brethren this is a commendable example of the true role of the Lodge Almoner, caring, conscientious and dedicated and the Almoner is very worthy of mention and is to be congratulated."
